The [Venice Fellowships Programme](#) is a key part of the British Council's presence in Venice, supporting the exhibition programme as well as being a platform for the development of new creative careers and future leaders. The Fellowship offers a unique opportunity for emerging creatives to represent the UK on an international level whilst broadening their perspective, making connections and developing their creative practice.

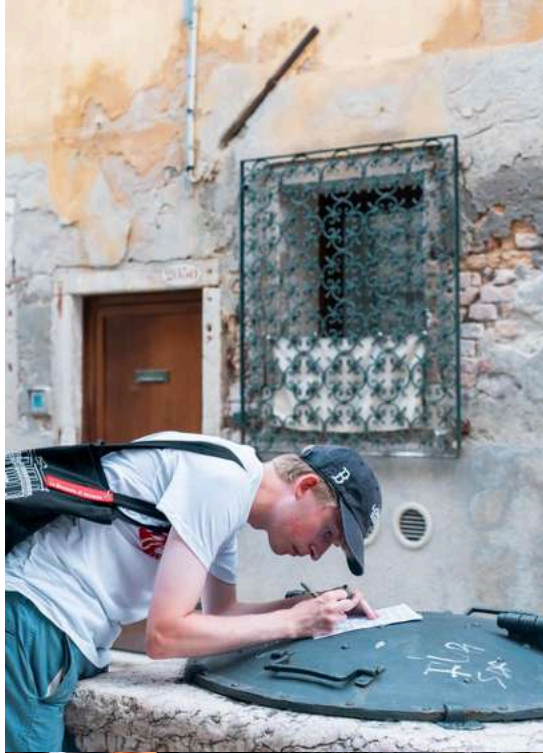
The Fellowships Programme enables creative students and professionals to spend a month in Venice during the world's most important art and architecture biennials. As exhibition ambassadors at the British Pavilion, the Fellows enrich and activate our exhibition programme. They engage visiting members of the public and expand the impact of the show. Alongside this practical residency, Fellows have the opportunity to develop their own research or practical creative projects and use the Biennale as a platform for artistic and professional development. Through these contributions, Fellows elevate the Pavilion to an important reference point for universities and creative organisations around the world.

Our Programme Partners are central to the Fellowship Programme. We welcome applications from new and returning institutions and organisations.

Partner applications for the 2026 Fellowships are now open. The deadline for applications is Friday 5th September 2025, 23:59 BST.

2026 BRITISH PAVILION EXHIBITION

The world-renowned British artist, Lubaina Himid RA, CBE (b. 1954, Zanzibar), will represent Great Britain and deliver a major solo exhibition of new work at the British Pavilion.

Known for a pioneering practice which addresses themes of race, history, feminism, cultural memory and identity, Lubaina Himid frequently employs storytelling and historical research to challenge dominant Eurocentric narratives and highlight the overlooked contributions of Black figures in Western history.

Himid lives and works in Preston, UK, and is Emeritus Professor of Contemporary Art at the University of Central Lancashire. One of the pioneers of the Black British Art Movement, Himid curated several significant exhibitions in the 1980s and 1990s, such as *Five Black Women* (1983) at the Africa Centre, London and *The Thin Black Line* (1985) at the Institute of Contemporary Arts (ICA), London, both of which showcased the work of Black female artists in response to their exclusion from mainstream galleries. In 2017, Himid was awarded the Turner Prize and in 2018 she received the honorary title of CBE for her contributions to the arts.

“Himid pushes the boundaries of painting practice through sound and sculptural installation, incorporating new materials, textures, narratives and formats in her work. Combining a radical optimism with social critique, she will transform the Pavilion with her vibrant, articulate and spatially dynamic artworks. Himid’s exhibitions take the visitor on an exploratory journey, which is why it’s so exciting to imagine how she will use the enfilade of six spaces in the British Pavilion. We are truly delighted to be working with Lubaina Himid on the British Council commission for 2026”.

2026 VENICE FELLOWSHIPS PROGRAMME

Each Fellow will receive a Travel Grant of £3,300 (three thousand and three hundred British pounds).

The Fellowships Programme has two major components:

1. Exhibition ambassador: Fellows will participate in a one-month group residency inside the British Pavilion: invigilating the exhibition spaces, engaging with the public, leading tours and acting as the face of the British Council and its exhibition commission.

Skills developed: cultural awareness and understanding; team-work and problem-solving; public speaking; public engagement; exhibition interpretation; personal confidence, resilience and adaptability; communication and foreign language; time-management.

Requested time commitment for invigilation is 23h per week during the period of one month.

2. Research or creative project: Fellows undertake fieldwork in Venice to inform their creative practice, research and/or academic interests. This fieldwork should be connected to the themes of Venice, La Biennale, the 61st International Art Exhibition, the British Pavilion and/or the 2026 commissioned exhibition.

Skills developed: time-management and planning; personal confidence and resilience; flexibility and collaboration; research, mapping and testing ideas; creativity and problem-solving; communication; audience engagement; project management.

INDUCTION

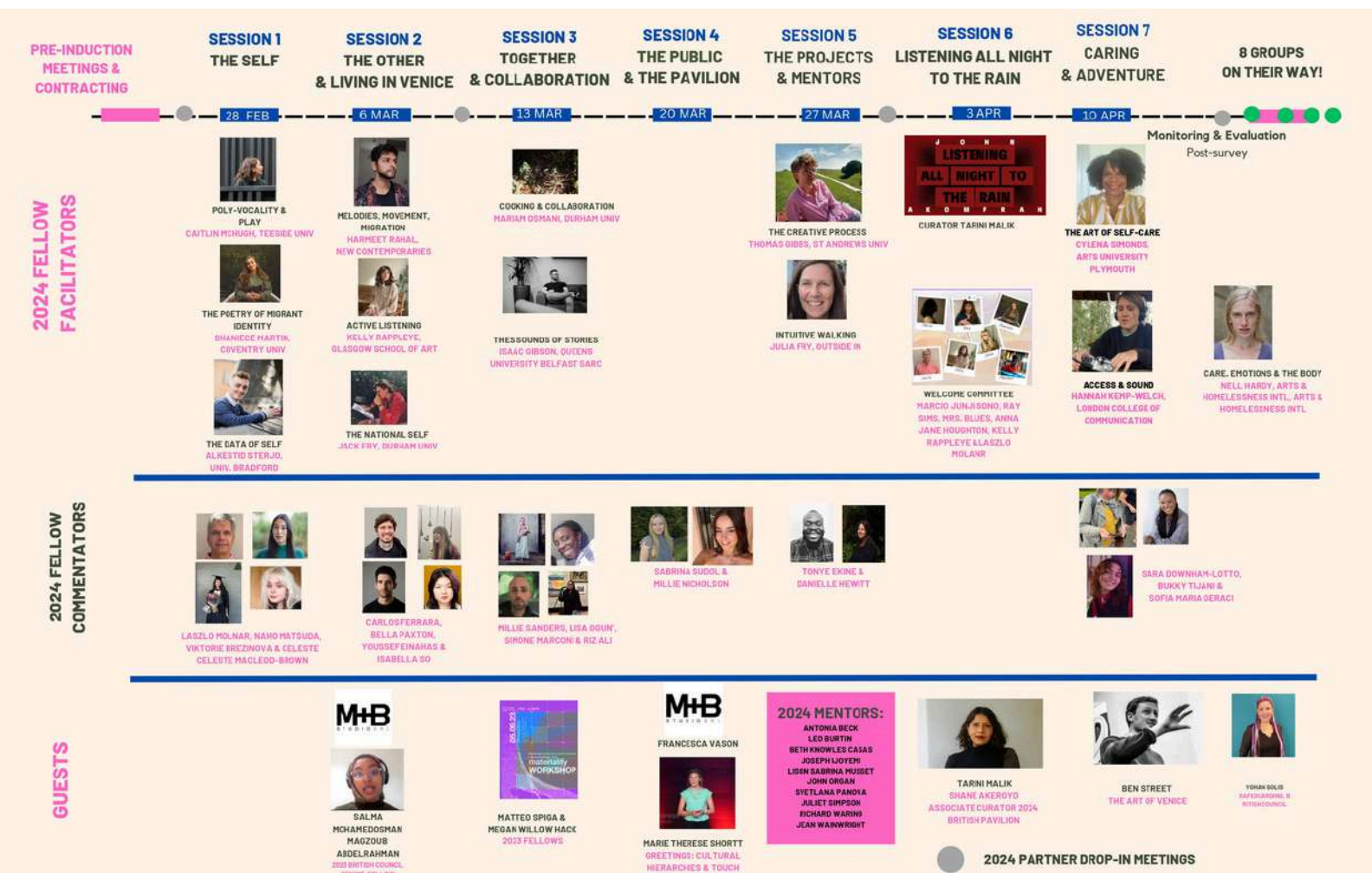
Fellows are required to attend an Online Induction School Training from February to April 2026 so they can prepare for their Venice trip, participate in a series of talks and workshops, and build together a community of practice throughout the 2026 year.



"It was magical to see how we came together in such a short period - I did not think this could be possible in an online environment. PROGRAMME EVALUATION

Since its start in 2014, the Fellowships Programme has welcomed over 400+ UK-based participants, from which:

- 65% have gone on to work in the arts/creative/cultural sector.
- 35% pursued/remained in the academic or researcher sectors.

Through their training and experience in supporting the exhibition at the British Pavilion, Fellows learn techniques for enhancing a visitor's understanding and expanding their perspectives on the show.

The invigilation experience provides them with valuable work experience and confidence in contributing to a gallery setting.



Key Highlights of the 2022 Programme Evaluation Report

- 92% of Fellows believe their employability is enhanced after participating in the Programme.
- 92% believe they are more likely to get work opportunities that would not have been open to them without the Fellowship.
- 71% believe that they can secure greater remuneration in the short term when applying for jobs.
- The Exhibition Ambassador residency at the British Pavilion resulted in an extensive skills development for the Fellows, but most strongly in improving: “cultural awareness & understanding”, “communicating with audiences & exhibition interpretation”, “personal confidence & resilience”, “foreign language skill”, “team-work & problem-solving”, “time-management & planning”.
- The Fellowship has resulted in 75% of Fellows better prepared for designing future research; 75% of Fellows better prepared for professional/academic international collaborations; 71% better prepared for future creative practice; and 67% better prepared for personal international collaboration.

CASE STUDY: SHANIECE MARTIN, COVENTRY UNIVERSITY

As related to British Council by 2024 Fellow, Shaniece Martin.

<Initially hesitant to apply to the Venice Fellowships Programme, Shaniece questioned whether she belonged in museums and artistic spaces. With a mixed Southeast Asian and British background, Shaniece grew up in a predominantly white village and didn't visit cultural institutions or venues as part of her upbringing.

But through creative writing, poetry, and Punjabi music, she began to reclaim her identity and connect with her heritage. Inspired by John Akomfrah's work and his reflections on representation and visibility, including after seeing his work on view at Tate, she found the courage to apply for the program. From her very first conversation, she felt genuinely seen and heard. Surrounded by a diverse cohort of Fellows from various backgrounds and experiences, the long-held insecurities—Am I good enough? Do I belong here?—began to dissolve. These doubts were replaced by a sense of deep listening, meaningful connection, and shared purpose within the group.

While in Venice, invigilating Akomfrah's exhibition became both an artistic and personal awakening for her. Initially overwhelmed by the sensory intensity of the dark, sound-filled space, she turned to writing—unapologetically capturing her thoughts in the dark, even when she couldn't read what she wrote. Her time spent in the exhibition became a precious gift: opportunities for intimate, one-on-one conversations with the public, reflections on identity, and a deeper understanding of her role in making art accessible and relevant. She left Venice with a renewed sense of confidence, creative clarity, and a strong commitment to using her voice and work to support others—especially fellow generational immigrants—in feeling truly seen, heard, and represented.

Following her Fellowship and on completion of her PhD, Shaniece felt confident to apply for the role of Archives Assistant at the Herbert Art Gallery & Museum in Coventry. She is supporting the development and installation of new displays in the 'Stories That Made Us: Roots, Resilience, Representation' exhibition, which celebrates and preserves the rich heritage of South Asian and British South Asian communities in Coventry.>



OPEN CALL FOR 2026 UK PROGRAMME PARTNERS

The British Council is looking for organisations and institutions to join the 2026 Venice Fellowships Programme as Programme Partners.

The Partners are central to supporting emerging creatives and future talents, and we welcome both returning and new partners each year. Partners recruit and identify the best candidates from their organisations to participate in the one-month residency during the 61st International Art Exhibition in Venice.

Each Partner contributes £2,300 per Fellow. This is matched by £1,000 from the British Council. The Fellow receives a total Travel Grant of £3,300.

Eligibility and Requirements

Potential organisations must fulfil the following criteria in order to be eligible to participate in the Programme:

- Are either:
 - a UK-based (England, Wales, Scotland, NI) and registered Higher Education Institution or
 - a UK-based Creative (Arts, Craft, Design, Architecture) Organisation, Cultural/Creative Hub, Social Enterprise, Charity, or CIC
- Have a demonstrated commitment to eliminating discrimination, promoting equality of opportunity, and fostering positive relations between people from different groups.
- Commit to the social values and impact of the Fellowships Programme and encourage Fellows from your organisation to consider how best to apply those values when planning their residency month and project.

ADDITIONAL OPPORTUNITIES FOR COLLABORATION AND NETWORKING

For Partners:

Partners are invited to join monthly online group calls and a shared Whatsapp group to build a community of practice over the Fellowship year.

The British Council extends an invitation to Programme Partners to join various launch events at the British Pavilion during the Vernissage days.

For Fellows:

There are additional opportunities for Fellows to attend cultural events and network with creative individuals during their month in Venice.

Subject to availability, these events may include:

- Private tours of the Peggy Guggenheim Collection, led by the 2026 Guggenheim Interns
- Art Night Venezia, organized by Ca' Foscari University and the City of Venice
- Feast of the Redentore
- Private Exhibition Tour at Ocean Space
- Events at National Pavilions within the Biennale

Fellows are offered opportunities to lead public tours in the Pavilion.
